Summary

1. To find potential organ donors, the hospital has assigned several persons to search in all hospitals.
2. "Our hospital is the only hospital in Inner Mongolia that is able to perform kidney transplants."
3. "The last year saw more transplant cases than the previous year, by more than a dozen cases." "The number of cases is going up each year."
4. "There is one transplant coming up tonight."
5. "In our department, what we have are kidneys. Usually they come in pairs. That is, one donor, two recipients."
6. Teacher Han, who was in charge of kidney transplant, came back near the end of the phone investigation. He was outside receiving kidneys.

Phone Investigation Recording

Nurse: Hmm...

Investigator: Hello, how are you? Is that the Inner Mongolia Baotou Steel Hospital?

Nurse: Yes.

Investigator: Oh, yes! Uh...I'm...I'm thinking that one of my relatives needs a kidney transplant, and I want to know whether your hospital can do it.

Nurse: Yes, we can.

Investigator: Oh yeah? So did you perform a lot of kidney transplants? How long do we have to wait for an organ on the waiting list?

Nurse: Sorry, I don't know. It depends on the availability of matching donors.

Investigator: Oh, do you do a lot of transplants this year, such as kidney transplants?

Nurse: Yes.

Nurse: Because we are now doing Donation after Cardio-Circulatory Death (DCD), which is what we do. (Investigator: Ah). There were not many until the last two years, because, you know, there were those death-row inmates available before.

Investigator: Right! Right!

Nurse: Now, you know, it is no longer allowed.

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: So now body donations are encouraged.

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: So...it is not until the last two years...

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: So we designated several people to search every hospital for possible donors.

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: Promoting this...

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: Therefore, for the last two years, there were more and more donation cases.

Investigator: Alright, people are ...

Nurse: The last year saw more transplant cases than the previous year, by more than a dozen cases.

Investigator: Does it mean...um...nowadays people's awareness of organ donation is getting stronger and stronger?

Nurse: Because our department is in charge of...several people were assigned to do this.

Investigator: Oh?

Nurse: To promote this in every hospital.

Investigator: Oh, does it mean that the state's website can allocate (organs) to you, right?

Nurse: No. Our hospital is the only hospital in Inner Mongolia that is able to perform kidney transplants.

Investigator: Let's say your hospital, for example, how many cases of kidney transplantation did you perform last year?

Nurse: It seemed to me that there were over 20 cases performed last year in our hospital. I forgot the number announced at last year's meeting. I forgot. There were more cases last year than the year before. The number of cases is going up each year.

Investigator: That is to say...

Nurse: There is one case coming up tonight.

Investigator: Oh, this year...

Nurse: Probably there will be one (case) tonight. It seems like there is one possible donor, but I'm not quite sure.

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: They, those people, already went there.

Investigator: The donor is just donating one organ, that is, just one kidney, or the whole body was donated?

Nurse: Um...I don't know. Either case is possible. Anyway, in our department, what we have are kidneys. Usually they come in pairs. That is, one donor, two recipients.

Investigator: Oh, that...that is nice! One person has just ...just two kidneys...right, two kidneys. Oh! According to you, the number won't exceed 100 or 200 cases, right?

Nurse: 100 or 200 cases? How can that be possible?

Investigator: Impossible?

Nurse: Where can... The key is, where do so many donors possibly come from?

Investigator: Ah!

Nurse: The operation is no problem, but there are not so many people donating!

Investigator: Short on donors...

Nurse: Yes.

Investigator: You...

Nurse: Just a second. The one in charge of kidney transplants just got back. He just came back after handling that thing. You want to speak to him?

Investigator: Um...where is he?

Nurse: He just arrived. He was out about receiving kidneys. I don't know how he was doing so far?

Investigator: Oh. Just the kidneys...

Nurse: How about...just one second, I'm asking him to take over the phone.

Investigator: Oh oh...ok, ok...thank you!

(Nurse shouting: Teacher Han! A phone call for you! 05:57~ 06:34 the call was still on, but nobody picked up the phone.)

Nurse (came back and picked up the phone): Um...you still there?

Investigator: Yeah.

Nurse: Um...

Investigator: Is he busy?

Nurse: Not really.

Investigator: Still busy?

Nurse: Um.

Investigator: Oh.

Nurse: Um...um...

Investigator: He...didn't get the organ. He is in charge of locating the donors, right?

Nurse: He is not in charge of finding donors. Instead, he is in charge of the coordination.

Investigator: Oh, coordination...

Nurse: Yeah.

Investigator: Coordination?

Nurse: Yes!
